ATRVC Inc. PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2024



Thank you for being members of the Australian Touring RV Club.

Your Management Committee has worked very well as a team, and I would like to thank each of them for their commitment to the roles they have taken on and the thoughtful way they have attended to business. Special thanks also to the spouses of the Committee members for their patience and support during the year.

We were unable to find a volunteer for the role of Vice President at the 2023 AGM and, although it is ideal to have seven members on the Committee, we were able to work with just the six members, who are:

You will no doubt note that all of the above reside in the same region. It is a coincidence. They were the only members who volunteered to fill the positions when they became vacant.

With five positions becoming vacant at the 2024 AGM, we were hopeful that members from other regions would volunteer. Sadly, as at the close of nominations, that did not happen.

There were no nominations received for the position of President. The Committee will appoint a Committee Member to fulfill that role.

There were no nominations received for one of the positions of Committee Person. Nominations for the position will be called for from the floor at the AGM.

Under Division 3 – Election of Committee members and tenure of office, Item 58 Terms of office, our Constitution states that: *All members of the Committee shall be eligible for re-election immediately on retirement for a maximum of three consecutive terms of two years or 6 consecutive years in total.*

I need to apologise. I was first elected to the Committee in 2016 and have held 3 different positions in the 8 years since – as Delegates Liaison Officer (DLO), then Vice President and then President. All I can say is that I am devastated that the Constitution has been breached. I have enjoyed my time on Committee, and, as the saying goes, "Time flies when one is having fun".

One of the Committee Person positions that was due for nomination in 2024 had been in breach of the Constitution by one year, thereby triggering an investigation.

Records have been updated and we trust that the Rules of our Constitution will be upheld.

2023-2024 Committee Meetings have been held every second month via Zoom. Ric Bennetts set up each meeting which was recorded. Thank you, Ric.

Interim communication has been by email and, when necessary, decisions were made by the 'Flying Minute' procedure. Face-to-face meetings were able to be conducted at the National Rally in Myrtleford in April, as we were all in attendance.

Many thanks to our Regional Delegates/Co-ordinators for the fantastic range of events they have conducted this year. Thank you also to the club members who have helped ease the load by helping out at rallies and also by organising rallies and lunches under the guidance of their Regional Delegates/Co-ordinators.

The Annual National Rally was held in Myrtleford Victoria in April this year. It was attended by all our Delegates, Coordinators and Committee Members. Although it is encouraged so that members are able to meet them, it is not mandatory that they attend.

The club's AGM is to be held within 5 months of the end of financial year and is usually held in September. Since 2020, the AGM has been conducted via Zoom, with members meeting up at an event in their region if possible, or by logging into the meeting elsewhere.

From a financial perspective, the Treasurer's Report reflects the sound financial position of the club. Additional funds have continued to be committed to our annual National Rally to continue to improve the standard of the event.

Our club is celebrating its 25th Anniversary this year. We celebrated in Myrtleford with a cake, and will be celebrating again with a \$30 per person "AGM Get-Together" subsidy that will be paid to the organiser of the registered events for use at the event.

We need to grow our Membership base. It is certainly an aged and ongoing concern that membership is declining – and it's not just our club. We need to speak to people about joining us. Full Membership is open to singles, couples and families with an RV. Associate Membership is available to those without an RV. Belonging to the ATRVC is not just about being able to participate in get-togethers, i.e. rallies or lunches, we have some aspects that benefit all our members.

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

Want to hide in plain sight and stealth camp?

The Cassette

No, this is not a tech article about an outdated storage medium for video or music!

It deals with that humble container hiding in the ensuite, under the bed or in the back of a vehicle, which if not available can cause much discomfort if `caught short'.

How did such a commonplace portable sanitary item evolve?

The humble repository has had many incarnations over the centuries to its present form. Originating in approx. 14BC. It was discovered in Egypt in a tomb belonging to Kha. Inside Kha's tomb, excavators uncovered a wooden stool (excuse the pun) with a hole cut into its centre, through which the overseer would presumably relieve himself into a vase-like object below. It's believed that the stool was placed in Kha's tomb to aid him on his journey in the afterlife.

In Pompeii, the bathrooms uncovered were found to be communal, they were adorned with frescoes and sculptures.

To aid interpersonal development, rows of holes were carved into cold, Italian marble slabs, not exactly feasible in a caravan!

To ancient Romans, the practice of sitting on a shared toilet in an open room full of people was entirely ordinary.

Roman toilets didn't flush. Some of them were tied

into internal plumbing and sewer systems, which often consisted of just a small stream of water running continuously beneath the toilet seats.

This arrangement morphed into the chamber pot, doing away with the seat. This type of vessel was used throughout Ancient Greece from 6BC. Again, highly portable, but did not address the problem of the smell, let alone usage in a caravan (which my research found were not invented in this era!)

The 'close stool', built as an article of furniture, is one of the earliest forms of portable toilet. Not exactly portable and take a lot of space in the van/vehicle!

The close stool was sometimes called a necessary stool or a night stool. The eighteenth-century euphemism was convenience.

Closely following the receptacle, was the method in which we tidied oneself after attending the call of nature.

As I always remembered the inconsequential rather than the hard facts of Latin, Calculus & Algebra, this ditty once learned, was never forgotten.

Thus, a method to which to the above could be achieved was developed.

A Roman user would sit down, take care of business, and watch number two float blissfully away down the sewer system. But instead of reaching for a roll of toilet paper, an ancient Roman would often grab a tersorium (or, in my technical terms, a "toilet brush for your butt"). A tersorium is an ingenious little device made by attaching a natural sponge (from the Mediterranean Sea, of course) to the end of a stick. Our ancient Roman would simply wipe him- or herself, rinse the tersorium in whatever was available (running water and/or a bucket of vinegar or salt water), and leave it for the next person to use. But if we don't add the requirement 'modern' to it, toilet paper has been around for at least twice as long.

The fact that the Chinese invented toilet paper didn't mean that it was immediately a widespread commodity all over the world. In the 15th century, toilet paper became more common. However, only from the 19th century onwards, the toilet paper industry really started picking up. It started to be manufactured on large scales all over the world and has been projected to reach US\$50 billion by 2032 (that's a lot of trees)

As our toilets are very portable & are now being housed in close proximity to our cooking/sleeping areas in our Vans, a new branch of technology has arisen to address the management of our output (refer Advert in the Traveller from one of our sponsors).

This then morphs into the subject of chemicals, the Pros & Cons of various mixes to minimize odour, aid the breakdown of solids/liquids & safe disposal (this is worthy of another article in itself)!

So, the next time you are enjoying your daily constitution (alone), consider it as a purely biological function that has spawned a multi-billion \$ industry & cultural changes through the centuries.


Tue 19/8 – All packed up & members dispersed for home or to continue their travels elsewhere. A great time was had by all.

Caravan sway, or snaking, is one of the most unsettling experiences you can ever have on the road, and it can, and does, lead to disaster.

Several factors cause caravan sway, but so we are clear, no amount of sway is acceptable, especially the inherent type that just develops at a certain speed, no matter the conditions. If you are experiencing caravan sway every time you tow, no matter how minor, something is wrong.

Sway is when the caravan is snaking or swerving behind the car. Because the caravan is following a swerving path, while the vehicle is mostly still going straight, it's actually going faster than the car towing it. Once we get our heads around that, understanding and dealing with sway is relatively easy.

There are many reasons a trailer could be 'going faster' than the car towing it. As a car brakes down a hill, the trailer's inertia will want it to keep moving forwards at the speed it was going. A gust of wind, hitting the trailer like the sail of a yacht, could add energy to the trailer, knocking it off course. Bumps or undulations in the road or even a sudden and sharp steering action to avoid a pothole or some wildlife, could force the suspension to work harder on one side, disrupting the trailer's balance.

Sway is also more likely to develop when the caravan carries most of its mass at its ends. Sometimes this is poor design, like when trailer manufacturers fit heavy accessories right back (like wheel carriers, toolboxes or water tanks) to lighten the hitch load. Other times it's because the most convenient storage spaces are at the ends of the caravan – under the bed and on the drawbar, and we Aussies love packing as much as we can.

So, there are a few things we can do. The first is to steer clear of caravans or trailers that have been 'balanced' by the manufacturer with heavy accessories on the rear. That's usually a mark of poor design. Caravans are best when they carry most of their mass down low and as close as possible to the axles.

When packing our trailers or caravans, aim to pack the heaviest things over the axles (working within the constraints of our caravan's layout, of course). Even consider spreading some of the load onto the tow car. Bikes might be better placed on the roof of the car, rather than the back of the caravan, for instance. Only pack the lightest things up high or at the back.



The best scenario is to have the caravan balanced so there's about 10 per cent of its total weight on the tow ball when it's under tow, without resorting to excessive mass on the rear. A little over or under is okay. Caravans handle best when they sit level. Nose up or down shifts weight to just one of the axles and reduces the contact it has with the road. Take some air out of the tow vehicle's front wheels, too, to increase their connection with the road.

Sway is best managed by slowing down the caravan. Although there's a lot of commentary saying you should accelerate out of sway, there's a whole host of reasons why that's a bad idea. More than likely, you'll just increase the chance of a crash, and you'll be going faster when it happens.

There is a range of great aftermarket products to deal with caravan sway, but most people probably have the means of slowing down their caravan at their fingertips already – the override function on your electronic brake control. Pressing it will apply the caravan's brakes only, very effectively slowing it down and bringing it into line with the car. It's a great skill to know exactly where that button is and to practice pressing it without looking at it, so you know you can do it in an emergency.



That's essentially how all the sway control systems work. While they vary in sophistication, all of them apply the caravan's brakes, when they detect sway, to slow it down to the same speed as the car. Some, like ESC from AL-KO, apply all the brakes at once. Others, like Dexter Sway Control, apply individual brakes to slow wheels one side at a time.

After getting bogged, I invented a system to help others get out of sticky situations'

As the Big Lap gets ever more popular, an increasing number of grey nomads are opting for off-road caravans and campers as they head off in search of less crowded pieces of paradise. Unfortunately, an awful lot of them are also getting stuck!

And that's what happened to veteran traveller Bruce Toole several years ago when he took his camper trailer over to Queensland's Moreton Island.

However, it turns out that getting seriously bogged in soft sand might have been one of the best things that happened to Bruce ... and that's because it inspired him to create a revolutionary system to help others who found themselves in a similar bind.

Bruce tried unhitching his camper trailer to free his bogged 4WD, but he then ran into the issue of getting it back over the sand to his 4WD to re-hitch. The Skid Row Trailer Recovery Skid can be used to retrieve bogged caravans or camper trailers.

This was a major problem due to the soft sand with no support for the jockey wheel to move the trailer.

On Moreton Island, it took Bruce and his travelling companion an hour to get rehitched, albeit with a damaged jockey wheel and a tow hitch full of sand. Knowing he wouldn't have been the first to face the same conundrum, Bruce returned to his Gold Coast home determined to find a solution.



After rigorous testing and design refinements spanning a year, the Skid Row Trailer Recovery Skid was born.

The device, which is manufactured from high-grade polypropylene and carries a lifetime warranty, will travel easily over a soft, muddy or snowy surface at a slow pace to get a 'stuck' trailer to secure ground.

Bruce says the 'skid' has been designed for use with or without the jockey wheel to accommodate different conditions in the retrieval process.

It can also double as a support platform for the jockey wheel when parked on soft ground, allowing users to manoeuvre their van or camper trailer in tight spots without the jockey wheel sinking into the ground. Additionally, the brightly-coloured 'skid' will keep the trailer hitch and mechanicals out of the sand and mud.

And it is very compact (77cm x 39cm x 21cm), making it easy for grey nomads to store on roof racks or in storage compartments. It weighs just 3.8 kilograms.

The Aussie designed and manufactured Skid Row Trailer Skid retails at \$199, with free freight Australia wide.




